WRAP Winners Listing for 2002

The Waste Reduction Awards Program (WRAP) was administered by CalRecycle (formerly the California Integrated Waste Management Board) from 1993-2011. WRAP provided an opportunity for California businesses and nonprofit organizations to gain public recognition for their outstanding waste reduction efforts and lets the community know the business takes waste reduction seriously. WRAP evaluated the waste reduction, procurement, and education activities in the internal business practices of the applicant, not its services or products.

3M Unitek

For over 53 years, 3M Unitek has been devoted to the discovery, development and manufacture of innovative orthodontic products that are used throughout the world. 3M Unitek's philosophy regarding recycling is "simplicity." The site's most successful recycling programs are its simplest: scrap metal and turnings, paper and cardboard. In 2001, the site recycled 112 tons of material from just these three sources. The total recycling efforts for the site in 2001 were in excess of 137.5 tons of material. Through the energy conservation and recycling programs implemented and continued in 2001, the site realized a cost savings of over \$75,000 for the year.

AB&I Foundry

AB&I Foundry, a third-generation family-owned business since 1906, is the largest manufacturer of cast iron soil pipe and fittings in the Western United States. Last year AB&I recycled over 40,000 tons of scrap iron to produce soil pipe, fittings, and custom castings (stove pan carriers, automotive castings, etc.). Even though AB&I recycles most of the waste produced, efforts to recycle 100 percent of all waste produced is a high priority. AB&I diverted 11,500 cubic yards of landfill waste sand for recycling and saved \$100,000 in disposal fees and transportation costs. AB&I future projects include recycling waste heat from the melting process to use in other areas or to generate electricity.

ABC Window Company is a mid-sized company that manufactures aluminum and vinyl windows. ABC is constantly searching for better ways/methods to reduce, reuse or recycle waste materials at their site. Employees are continuously reminded of their roles in the company's waste reduction efforts. To encourage participation, half of the revenues generated through recycling programs are deposited into an employee fund for the employees to spend however they choose. Through waste reduction efforts ABC Window Co. has saved approximately \$3,500.00 per month in solid waste disposal bills alone. ASP has completed 99% of J&J's Energy Star Best Practices, saving ASP more than \$150,000 and more importantly, reduced carbon dioxide emissions by 740,000 pounds since 1997. Agilent Technologies' products provide solutions and technologies that revolutionize the way people live and work in test and measurement, semiconductor products, life sciences and chemical analysis. Agilent Laboratories has implemented a comprehensive solid waste-recycling program to divert, reuse or recycle material destined to be landfilled. This includes a program to donate surplus equipment and materials to nonprofit organizations and schools. In 2001, Agilent Labs reduced solid waste, destined to be landfilled, by 37.8 tons and saved more than \$7,000 by recycling materials such as waste paper and laboratory glass and plastic. Additionally, Agilent Labs implemented an energy conservation program, which resulted in reductions in electricity by 11 percent and natural gas usage by 15 percent.

Customer savings through waste reduction is a major focus with emphasis on reusing rather than discarding. Nearly all parts and packing materials in All Laser Service products are reused or recycled. Each remanufactured toner cartridge represents as much as five pounds of non-biodegradable waste diverted from landfills and provides as much as a 50 percent cost savings to the end user. Amici's East Coast Pizzeria Restaurants offer traditional east coast style pizzas complemented by a casual Italian menu. Their menu is also available for takeout or delivery to local homes and businesses. As part of its comprehensive recycling program, Amici's has successfully encouraged neighboring businesses to share its recycling facilities. Staff are trained in guiding customers not to over order so as to minimize the amount of food waste generated. Between its five locations, Amici's diverts approximately 1300 cubic yards of potential waste destined for landfills to be recycled instead. Energy saving measures such as keeping light turned off during daylight hours and opening windows instead of using air conditioning have helped to cut power bills by a total of \$10,000 per year across the company.

Anheuser-Busch InBev - Los Angeles Brewery

The Anheuser-Busch, Inc. Los Angeles Brewery located in Van Nuys, California is the world's third largest brewery, manufacturing and packaging 13 million barrels of various malt beverages annually. The brewery's operations are, and continue to be, designed to integrate pollution prevention methodology into every process. As a result, the Los Angeles Brewery was able to recycle over 99.5 percent (approximately 250,000 tons) of its waste solids and by-products in the year 2001. The brewery also utilizes a Bioenergy Recovery System which has reduced the facility's wastewater BOD by over 72 percent and fossil fuel dependency by 20 percent. The Los Angeles Brewery saves over \$6 million each year due to its extensive environmental program.

Anheuser-Busch, Inc., Fairfield Brewery

The Anheuser-Busch, Fairfield Brewery produces over 4 million barrels of beer. Located along I-80 in Fairfield, Solano County, California, the brewery was designed with pollution prevention in mind, recycling 98.8 percent of its waste and by-products (nearly 100,000 tons/year) during 2001. The brewery saves over 100 billion BTU's of energy recovered from a closed loop heat recovery system. The Fairfield Brewery is the only brewery within the United States to be certified ISO 14001. Some recycle/reclaim examples are: the Brewery produced 295,000 gallons of ethanol from waste/recovered beer; the Brewery recovered over 94,100 tons of grain for livestock feed; and, over 225 tons of beechwood chips were collected for off-site composting or energy recovery.

In 2002, APW Electronic Solutions reduced waste designed to be landfilled by 133 metric tons and saved \$275,000 on redesigning packaging, modifying the manufacturing process to use fewer materials, reusing surplus suppliers and equipment and selling recyclable material such as waste paper, scrap metal, and plastic. They saved additional energy by reducing their daily kilowatt usage by 1500 kilowatts per hour.

Armstrong World Industries, Inc. plant located in South Gate, California, likes to push the envelope when it comes to finding solutions to making a better product and using resources intelligently. The overall goal is to make sure that activities as a corporation are in harmony with the natural world around. However, there was still material falling into their water bath. This new process could possibly prevent 105 tons of waste material from ever being produced in the first place! Armstrong is an environmentally conscious company that demonstrates the idea of Reduce, Reuse and Recycle!

Artmond Louie's Dental Office is proud to participate in the WRAP awards program for the fourth year in a row. The entire staff participates in their waste reducing efforts. It works closely with its local recycler who keeps it informed of new ideas and companies that are globally conscious. The front office produces a great amount of paper waste that has been significantly reduced due to its Office Recycling Policy. The office prints on both sides of all paper before recycling. Paper usage in the office has been reduced due to increased electronic claims submission abilities and the ability to do many tasks via the Internet that were previously paper producing tasks. It re-uses most mailers and recharges its toner cartridges rather than purchasing new ones. The office also recycles every bit of cardboard it receives. It purchases as many items as possible made from recycled products. This year's energy crisis has made the office more aware than ever. On hot days, the office works with the lights off except the ones over the patient chairs. The office estimates an average savings of \$3,600 per year, which it expects to increase with additional recycling efforts.

Ball Metal Beverage Container, Torrance Can Plant

Ball Metal Beverage Container, Torrance Can Plant, manufactures 12-ounce and 16-ounce aluminum beverage can for the west coast beer and soft drink market. Ball Torrance makes every effort to conserve energy and recycle where they can. Since the California energy crisis they have limited the use of electric lights, added motion detector switches and generally raised everyone's awareness of the need to conserve energy. Making a can from recycled aluminum takes 95 percent less energy than making new one. One of their largest successes has been redirecting a waste stream that they were sending to the landfill, but they now send this filtercake to a recycler who makes asphalt with their waste as an incoming feedstock. With all of the efforts made by Korbel over a ten-year period, it has been able to reduce its large container refuse to landfill costs by 50 percent.

Wade Landscape is a medium size landscape design, installation and maintenance company in South Orange County. The company is in a highly sensitive environmental area and every effort is made to reduce the stream of waste that cannot be recycled. On the job site all plant containers, brass parts, beverage cans, and other similar materials are returned to the nurseries or recycled. They separate their green waste from their trash so that the green waste may be returned to a recycling facility where they buy their mulch. A significant part of the business is renovating existing landscape areas. This generates a large amount of brass that is no longer usable. The employees collect and store that material at the company location and return it to a brass recycler with the employees keeping the money generated. They also encourage beverage cans in the same way. In the course of a year the company diverted about 100 tons of material. They estimate that they save approximately \$10,000 per year from their efforts but that is not the reason they do it. The brass and beverage can collection actually cost the company money but it provides a bonus for the employees and gives them an opportunity to participate in this all-important effort.
