

Inspection Item – Edible Food Recovery Organization (FRO)			
1. FRO has shown a record of the following pursuant to Section 18991.5 (a) (2):			
a) The name, address and contact information for each commercial edible food generator that the organization receives edible food from.			
b) The quantity <b>in pounds</b> of edible food received from each commercial edible food generator per month.			
c) The name, address and contact information for each food recovery service*, if any, that the organization receives edible food from for food recovery.			
2. Operator can demonstrate, by way of written records, that a training program which discusses safe food handling procedures for recoverable foods is in place.			
3. General food safety protocols are being followed including segregated storage and proper temperature control for recoverable foods.			

\* Food recovery service means a person or entity that collects and transports edible food from a commercial edible food generator to a food recovery organization or other entities for food recovery.

(C) Food service provider. (D) Food distributor.	Tier 2 Commercial Edible Food Generators: (A) Restaurant with 250 or more seats, or a total facility size equal to or greater than 5,000 square feet. (B) Hotel with an on-site food facility and 200 or more rooms. (C) Health facility with an on- site food facility and 100 or more beds. (D) Large venue/Event. (F) A state agency with a cafeteria with 250 or more seats or a total cafeteria 36 facility size equal to or greater than 5,000 square feet	Food Recovery Organizations include, but not limited to: (A) Food bank as defined in Section 113783 of the Health and Safety Code; (B) Nonprofit charitable organization as defined in Section 113841 of the Health and Safety code; and, (C) Nonprofit charitable temporary food facility as defined in Section 113842 of the Health and Safety Code.
