for 2024 wildfire cleanups managed by CalRecycle have continued with some key milestones reached in the last month.

The wet weather both in north and south, has been welcomed but requires safety allowances while continuing work.

6:30

More than a third of properties for the Park fire have been cleared of debris. The Thompson fire near Orville Dam is at the 50% mark

6:37

and 92% of the properties from Clear Lake Spoils fire have been cleared.

6:47

In Kern County. The cleanup is approaching completion for the Burrell fire. 90% of homes destroyed in the fire have been cleared, with only 14 remaining.

6:54

All trees on private property that were in danger of falling on public infrastructure have been removed and over half the properties have passed.

7:01

Oil inspections and final walkthroughs and have been returned to the county and property owners for rebuilding.

7:06

And that's it for disaster debris recovery operations. Thank you. Back to you, Maria. Thank you, Derek, and welcome again to the team.

CalRecycle's local government waste Hire Enforcement Grant program covers costs for things like program, stop administration equipment and travel

14:32

to support local oversight of neighborhood businesses. And a facility that generates waste tires, whether it be airports, golf

14:39

courses, the mechanic shop. Local inspectors ensure local businesses meet state standards

14:44

for safe hauling tires, storage disposal and record keeping. They take time to really educate the business owners.

For taking my comment today. And good morning. I'm Susan Collins.

I'm the president of the Container Recycling Institute. And my comment is about the reporting

30:05

of the beverage container fund in the governor's budget. It's something that I've brought up for many years in the past.

30:12

We reviewed the governor's budget again this week, and I want to report on what I'm what I've found.

30:19

I'm concerned about the chronic misreporting that has occurred over the last 17 years

30:25

in the governor's budget with regard to the beverage container recycling fund. This year, as in past years, we obtained CalRecycle reports to the Department

30:34

of Finance and compared the numbers to the governor's budget line by line.

30:39

And to be clear, the numbers I'm referring to are not projections.

30:44

They are the financial statement figures for the past year, which is the 2024 fiscal year.

30:51

And the books were closed on that year last fall. And CalRecycle sent their official statements to the Department of Finance.

31:01

All of the agencies have to do that. And the Department of Finance is supposed to use those figures

31:07

to prepare the governor's budget. We found errors in all

31:12

five of the funds for the beverage container Fund, the sum of the errors

31:18

across all of the line items totaled only \$179 million for fiscal year 2024.

31:26

The good news is that the level of errors has improved compared to the past couple of years.

31:31

Two years ago, the sum of the errors exceeded \$1.5 billion and now the sum of the errors is only \$179 million.

31:40

But that is still a staggering amount of errors for any financial statement.

31:47

For the most part, the line items in the beverage container recycling fund that is fund number 0133 were reported correctly.

31:56

I will send a detailed letter with spreadsheets to both CalRecycle and the Legislative Budget committees.

32:01

Thank you for your attention to this matter.

32:07

Thank you, Susan. We'll take a look. Are there any other Zoom calls?

32:14

Yes, we have one more comment from Leonard.

32:19

I'm going to ask you to unmute. Good morning and thank you.

32:29

I came across a document. It was a document from the U.S. DOJ solicitor general to Senator Grassley,

32:39

and it seems to indicate that in their legal interpretation, administrative law,

32:45

judges are not constitutional. Are you aware of that document?

32:51

And do you see any effect on the California Administrative law system, administrative hearing system?

33:00

We haven't seen the document and no, don't have an assessment of the impact at this time.

33:08

I'll see if I can get you a copy.

33:13

That's it for me. Thank you.

33:20

Yeah, we have another comment. From Heidi Sanborn.

33:25

We can ask you to unmute. Thank you so much. And thank you for the update.

33:33

As you know, there was a very big decision last Friday from the governor's office to not release the SB 54 regulations to OEL.

33:42

And I just want to highlight how impactful that decision has been to industry.

33:50

We have had multiple companies call us and say, what do we do? What do we do?

33:55

And I've been telling them the law is the law proceed as planned.

34:02

But the sooner we get these regulations back on track and done, the better.

34:08

And I'm saying this all my colleagues who are out there lobbying to delay them, I sincerely hope we can all work together to get these regulations

34:17

and the minor tweaks fixed and get them back and finished so that companies have certainty in a time when we've got tariffs

34:23

coming from the federal government. A lot of uncertainty out and in the markets.

34:28



And the last thing they need right now is more uncertainty. So I just want to get that on the record.

34:34

And for the EPS, which was the first expanded polystyrene, the ban that was going to go into place January 1st after

34:42

the determination was made, they weren't recycling 25% of that material.

34:49

It would be extremely helpful to have something to point to from the state that says it's in place.

34:55

We have literally nothing to talk to restaurants about or purchasers, and just hope that the sellers of

35:00

those products are not selling them into California. But we're still seeing it out there and.

35:06

We hope it's just sell through. But I think it's a very big missed opportunity of a very strongly and thoughtfully negotiated bill

35:14

to have a delay on that at a time we've got so much litter. So just wanted to say those things.

35:19

Thank you. Thank you for the comment.

35:25

And as I mentioned earlier, CalRecycle and the administration is fully supportive of the of maintaining those deadlines

35:31

in SB 54, including the rates and dates that are in statute. So thank you very much. And we will be reaching out with that.

35:39

A new timeline very shortly.

35:47
