Overview

Review Process

The Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery's (CalRecycle) Jurisdiction and Agency Compliance and Enforcement Branch (JACE) is required to conduct a compliance evaluation (California Public Resources Code (PRC) Section 41821(h) and Title 14 of the California Code of Regulations (14 CCR) Section 18996.1) of the City of Cudahy (Jurisdiction) implementation of and compliance with:

- Short-Lived Climate Pollutants (SLCP) (14 CCR sections 18981.1 through 18998.4).
- Mandatory Commercial Organics Recycling (MORe) (California Public Resources Code (PRC) sections 42649.8 through 42649.87).

- Mandatory Commercial Recycling (MCR) (PRC sections 42649-42649.7 and 14 CCR sections 18835-18839).
- Source Reduction and Recycling Element (SRRE) (PRC sections 41000 through 41460).
- Household Hazardous Waste Element (HHWE) (PRC sections 41500 through 41516).

JACE's compliance evaluation reviewed the Jurisdiction's waste diversion program implementation, using available information from the Jurisdiction's Implementation Record, Electronic Annual Report (EAR), CalRecycle databases, and communications between CalRecycle and the Jurisdiction. The compliance evaluation included, but was not limited to:

- Communications with the Jurisdiction (phone calls, emails, and letters) to learn about the community and program implementation efforts.
- Field evaluations of the Jurisdiction's residential, commercial, edible food, and procurement programs. Evaluations also included observations on MORe, MCR, SRRE, and HHWE.
- Observing and evaluating the Jurisdiction's waste, recycling, and organics loads at respective facilities.

JACE did not evaluate SLCP requirements that became effective on January 1, 2024, as the compliance evaluation commenced prior to the date that the requirements became effective. These requirements are inspections of Tier Two commercial edible food generators [14 CCR Section 18995.1(a)(2)] and enforcement actions [14 CCR sections 18995.1(a)(5) and 18995.4].

Communication and Compliance Evaluation Timeline

The Jurisdiction was notified on April 3, 2023, by letter (Attachment 1), that a compliance evaluation would be conducted by JACE to determine the status of the Jurisdiction's implementation of programs designed to divert organics and edible food from landfills.

- April 17, 2023, JACE sent a letter (Attachment 2) to request access to the Jurisdiction's Implementation Record by May 1, 2023.
- May 25, 2023, JACE followed up through (e-mail, phone call, Teams meeting) after the Jurisdiction did not respond to the request for access to the Jurisdiction's Implementation Record.
- June 8, 2023, the Jurisdiction provided access to its Implementation Record.
- October 18, 2023, the Jurisdiction and JACE staff met to review documentation that was missing from the Implementation Record and to request additional information.
- November 29, 2023, JACE staff conducted a field visit. JACE staff observed residential and commercial containers. See Field Visit Map for the Jurisdiction (Attachment 4) for locations where observations were made. JACE staff also visually observed loads at the two transfer stations:
 - Six (6) residential gray container loads

- Four (4) bulky waste loads
- Two (2) curbside collection loads
- One (1) residential blue container load
- Two (2) commercial gray container loads
- On December 18, 2023, December 26, 2023, and January 3, 2024, JACE staff renewed the request for additional information from the Jurisdiction needed to complete the compliance evaluation. At the time of completion of this report, the Jurisdiction has not provided the requested information relevant to missing information in the IR and program/site details.
- November 6, 2024, JACE staff sent the Jurisdiction a draft findings report with the opportunity to provide feedback.
- November 14, 2025, the Jurisdiction responded to the draft findings report with no additional information being provided about programs that were found noncompliant in the report.
- Communications and other interactions took place with the Jurisdiction throughout the compliance evaluation, which included phone calls and email messages, site visit, and meetings.

Existing Jurisdiction Conditions

The Jurisdiction is in Los Angeles County. According to the 2021 U.S. Census, the Jurisdiction encompasses 1.23 square miles. The Jurisdiction has a population of 22,294 (Department of Finance, 2021). According to the Jurisdiction's base year history (1990), 49 percent of the Jurisdiction's total waste generation is from the residential waste stream and 51 percent from the non-residential waste stream.

Summary of Jurisdiction's Solid Waste Infrastructure and Materials Flow

Through Jurisdiction interviews, it was determined that the Jurisdiction has one hauler, Consolidated Disposal Services (Republic Services), with an exclusive franchise agreement to collect gray, blue, and green container materials for all residents and commercial businesses. Residents and commercial businesses are also allowed to self-haul their materials for recycling and disposal.

Materials collected in the Jurisdiction are taken to one of two transfer stations:

- Republic Services Innovative Waste Transfer Station located in Vernon.
- 2. Republic Services Bel-Art Transfer Station located in Long Beach.

Gray container material is comingled with other jurisdictions' material, loaded in transfer trailers, and disposed at Sunshine Canyon Landfill.

Blue container material is mixed with other jurisdictions' recyclables, loaded in transfer trailers, and processed at Puente Hills Material Recovery Facility (MRF).

Green container material is mixed with other jurisdictions' organic material, loaded in transfer trailers, and taken to CVT Anaheim for processing.

Self-hauls have access to multiple facilities in the Southern California area.

The Jurisdiction does not provide for mixed organic collection and reported that it does not use a High Diversion Organic Waste Processing Facility (HDOWPF).

Article 3: Organic Waste Collection Services

14 CCR Section 18984.1. Three-Container Organic Waste Collection Services

Finding: Noncompliant

The Jurisdiction has not implemented a three-container collection system for both residential and commercial waste generators.

The Jurisdiction's Implementation Record indicated that 1,982 residential generators have gray containers, 1,946 have blue containers, and one (1) has a green container. For the commercial generators, the Jurisdiction did not provide the number of commercial generators that have gray or blue containers. The Jurisdiction's Implementation Record indicated that eight (8) commercial generators have green containers.

During the JACE staff field investigation, it was confirmed that not all residential and commercial organic waste generators had been provided with the required three containers.

14 CCR Section 18984.4. Recordkeeping Requirements for Compliance with Organic Waste Collection Services

Finding: Noncompliant

As noted in the findings for 14 CCR Section 18984.1, the Jurisdiction has not implemented a three-container system. The records provided do not match the collection system observed at the time of the evaluation.

14 CCR Section 18984.5. Container Contamination Minimization

Finding: Noncompliant

The Jurisdiction's Implementation Record indicates that route reviews and waste evaluations are conducted for container contamination minimization. However, the Jurisdiction did not provide any documentation to show that route reviews or waste evaluations have been conducted. During discussions with the Jurisdiction on October 18, 2023, the Jurisdiction confirmed that no route reviews or waste evaluations have been conducted (14 CCR Section 18984.5(b-c)).

JACE staff's field visit photo report (Attachment 3) and field visit map (Attachment 4) show examples and locations of JACE staff's observations of containers with prohibited contaminants. During JACE staff's field investigation of the containers that were deployed, the following was observed:

Residential sector containers:

- 91 gray containers
 - o 79 of the 91 containers had contaminants
- 45 blue containers
 - o 39 of the 45 containers had contaminants
- o Zero (0) green containers
- Commercial sector containers:
 - 25 gray containers
 - o 25 of the 25 containers had contaminants
 - Zero (0) blue containers
 - Zero (0) green containers

<u>14 CCR Section 18984.6. Recordkeeping Requirements for Container Contamination Minimization</u>

Finding: Noncompliant

The Jurisdiction's Implementation Record does not contain the records required by Section 18984.6.

Compliance with this section could not be evaluated as only older functional containers were observed.

14 CCR Section 18984.11. Waivers Granted by a Jurisdiction

Finding: Compliant

While the Jurisdiction has a process to issue waivers, the Jurisdiction has not issued any waivers.

14 CCR Section 18984.13. Emergency Circumstances, Abatement, Quarantined Materials and Federally Regulated Waste

Finding: Not applicable

The Jurisdiction has not reported equipment or operational failure, sediment debris disposal, homeless encampment or illegal disposal cleanup, or quarantined organic waste that was disposed which would require documentation.

14 CCR Section 18984.14. Recordkeeping Requirements for Waivers and Exemptions

Finding: Compliant

The Jurisdiction's Implementation Record contains a written description of how waivers will be issued and validated. The Jurisdiction reported not issuing any waivers and there are no records of the issued waivers in the Jurisdiction's Implementation Record. The Jurisdiction has not reported sediment debris disposal, homeless encampment or illegal disposal cleanup, or quarantined organic waste that was disposed per 14 CCR Section 18984.13.

Article 3 Electronic Annual Report Findings

In the Jurisdiction's Electronic Annual Report (EAR), for reporting year 2022, the Jurisdiction reported providing a 3+, 3-, 2-, and 1-container collection system to residential and commercial generators. A three-container collection system should be the only selection for residential and commercial generators in the EAR consistent with the Jurisdiction's adopted ordinance. For reporting year 2022, zero (0) route reviews were reported as being conducted. For the 2021 and 2022 EAR the Jurisdiction reported zero (0) waivers being issued.

Article 4: Education and Outreach

14 CCR Section 18985.1. Organic Waste Recovery Education and Outreach

Finding: Noncompliant

No evidence was provided indicating that the Jurisdiction has provided education and outreach information that is consistent with the collection system approved in the

Jurisdiction's adopted ordinance. No evidence was provided indicating that education and outreach was provided to generators regarding the donation of edible food or the option to self-haul organic waste.

No evidence was provided indicating that the Jurisdiction has implemented any of the requirements in this section (14 CCR Section 18985.2(a-b)).

<u>14 CCR Section 18985.3. Recordkeeping Requirements for a Jurisdiction's Compliance</u> with Education and Outreach Requirements

Finding: Noncompliant

The Jurisdiction's Implementation Record did not contain all the records required by Section 18985.3. The records provided by the Jurisdiction did not contain specifics on the dissemination of education and outreach materials.

Article 4: Electronic Annual Report Findings

Based on the 2022 EAR, there are 1,964 generators that have been provided with required information on collection. The Jurisdiction reported only one (1) commercial edible food generator that has been provided information regarding the Jurisdiction's edible food recovery program. This is inconsistent with JACE staff observations in the field in which two (2) Tier 1 commercial edible food generators were observed.

Article 7: Regulation of Haulers

14 CCR Section 18988.1. Jurisdiction Approval of Haulers and Self-Haulers

Finding: Noncompliant

No evidence was provided indicating that the Jurisdiction has implemented any of the requirements in this section (14 CCR Section 18988.1(a-b)).

14 CCR Section 18988.4. Recordkeeping Requirements for Compliance with

Finding: Noncompliant

The Jurisdiction's Implementation Record does not contain the records required by Section 18988.4.

<u>Article 8: CALGreen Building Standards and Model Water Efficient Landscape</u> Ordinance

14 CCR Section 18989.1. CALGreen Building Codes

Finding: Noncompliant

No evidence was provided indicating that an ordinance was adopted that requires compliance with the California Green Building Standards Code, California Code of Regulations, Title 24, Part 11 as amended July 1, 2019, and effective January 1, 2020, for Section 4.408.1 Construction Waste Management Residential and Section 5.408.1 Construction Waste Management non-residential.

14 CCR Section 18989.2. Model Water Efficient Landscape Ordinance

Finding: Compliant

A Model Water Efficient Landscape Ordinance (MWELO) was adopted and was provided by the Jurisdiction.

Article 8 Electronic Annual Report Findings

No information regarding the ordinance was found the 2022 EAR. In the 2022 EAR, the Jurisdiction reported zero (0) CALGreen or Model Water Efficient Landscape projects.

Article 9: Locally Adopted Standards and Policies

14 CCR Section 18990.1. Organic Waste Recovery Standards and Policies

Finding: Compliant

There was no evidence that the Jurisdiction had an ordinance, policy, procedure, permit condition, or initiative listed in 14 CCR Section 18990.1(b)(1-5).

14 CCR Section 18990.2. Edible Food Recovery Standards and Policies

Finding: Compliant

There was no evidence of an ordinance, policy, or procedure that prohibits the ability of a generator, food recovery organization, or food recovery service to recover edible food that could be recovered for human consumption.

The Jurisdiction was not identified in Los Angeles County's 2022 - 2024 Capacity

<u>Article 12: Procurement of Recovered Organic Waste Products</u>

14 CCR Section 18993.1. Recovered Organic Waste Product Procurement Target

Finding: Noncompliant

The Jurisdiction did not meet its Recovered Organic Waste Product (ROWP) procurement target for 2022. The Jurisdiction has a procurement target of 1,900 ROWP units. In the 2022 EAR, the Jurisdiction reported procuring 200 ROWPs which included procuring mulch. The Jurisdiction did not provide evidence that a mulch ordinance or enforceable mechanism was adopted as required by Section 18993.1(f)(4)(A).

14 CCR Section 18993.2. Recordkeeping Requirements for Recovered Organic Waste Procurement Target

Finding: Noncompliant

The Jurisdiction's Implementation Record does not contain records required by Section 18993.2.

14 CCR Section 18993.3. Recycled Content Paper Procurement Requirements

Finding: Noncompliant

No evidence was provided indicating that the Jurisdiction procured paper products meeting recycled content requirements pursuant to Public Contract Code 22150 – 22154, besides printing and writing paper.

The Jurisdiction has adopted a Mandatory Organic Waste Disposal Reduction Ordinance that includes it will impose penalties in the correct penalty amounts consistent with 14 CCR Section 18997.2.

Mandatory Commercial Organics Recycling (MORe)

PRC Section 42649.82

The Jurisdiction has not fully implemented its Mandatory Commercial Organics Recycling program.

The Jurisdiction has not provided evidence or reported that commercial businesses have been notified of their noncompliance.

MORe Electronic Annual Report Findings

In the Jurisdiction's 2022 EAR, it is reported that out of 186 commercial businesses that are required to recycle organics, zero (0) are recycling organics. This is a compliance rate of zero (0) percent. The Jurisdiction has not provided documentation or reported that the 186 commercial businesses not recycling are self-hauling organic material for diversion.

Mandatory Commercial Recycling (MCR)

PRC Section 42649.3 and 14 CCR Section 18838

The Jurisdiction has not fully implemented its Mandatory Commercial Recycling program.

The Jurisdiction has not provided evidence or reported that commercial businesses not recycling have been notified of their noncompliance.

MCR Electronic Annual Report Findings

In the Jurisdiction's 2022 EAR, it is reported that out of 250 businesses required to recycle, 50 are recycling. This is a compliance rate of 20 percent. The Jurisdiction has not provided documentation or reported that the remaining 200 commercial businesses not recycling are self-hauling recyclable materials for diversion.

Source Reduction Recycling Element Program (SRRE)

Residential Diversion Program

The Jurisdiction has not provided evidence or reported full implementation of a residential diversion program.

In the Jurisdiction's 2022 EAR, the Jurisdiction reported no changes to any SRRE-selected diversion programs. The Jurisdiction has nine (9) thrift shops in or near the Jurisdiction for the donation of unwanted goods and at least three (3) flea markets that residents can participate in. There are 10 beverage container buy-back drop-off locations in the area.

No residential green container loads were observed due to the Jurisdiction not having a separate route for the collection of organic material.

On November 29, 2023, JACE staff viewed gray and blue container loads. In total, seven (7) residential loads were viewed.

JACE staff evaluated 45 blue carts and observed an average contamination rate of 27.4 percent. JACE staff observed and evaluated one (1) blue container load. The load observed contained approximately 30 percent prohibited container contaminants with most notably plastic film, green waste, and wood waste. Blue container loads did contain organic material (paper products and printing and writing paper). Wood, dry lumber, and textiles are not allowed in the blue container.

JACE staff evaluated 91 gray carts and observed an average contamination rate of 29.7 percent. Staff observed and evaluated six (6) gray container loads, with four (4) loads being the Jurisdiction's bulky waste pickup, and two (2) being from the curbside collection program. The bulky waste loads contained approximately 45 percent divertible materials. The most significant materials being green waste, wood waste, and cardboard. The gray container loads contained approximately 50 percent divertible materials. These loads were wet indicating a significant amount of organic waste (food scraps) and green waste, in addition to non-organic recyclables.

Commercial Diversion Program

The Jurisdiction has not provided evidence or reported full implementation of a commercial diversion program.

No commercial green container loads were observed due to the Jurisdiction not having a separate route for the collection of organic material.

On November 29, 2023, JACE staff viewed gray container loads. In total, two (2) commercial gray container loads were viewed.

JACE staff were unable to evaluate any commercial blue containers due to limited access at commercial businesses. Additionally, the Jurisdiction did not report when commercial recycling is collected. No commercial blue container loads were viewed or evaluated by JACE staff.

JACE staff evaluated 25 gray containers and observed an average of 42.3 percent prohibited container contaminants. JACE staff observed and evaluated two (2) gray container loads. JACE staff observed approximately 40 percent divertible materials. These loads were wet indicating a significant amount of organic waste (food scraps) and green waste, in addition to non-organic recyclables.

Construction and Demolition Debris

The Jurisdiction has not provided evidence or reported full implementation of a construction and demolition debris diversion program.

JACE staff found limited information on Los Angeles County's household hazardous waste webpage that was specific for the Jurisdiction and the Jurisdiction did not provide any additional information to support program implementation.
