Project Summary: CalRecycle has edited the following summary to reflect the approved grant project: The illegal dump site coined the "Debris Field" is a 45 acre parcel on the privately owned Bertotti Ranch in Lassen County. The entire ranch totals 360 acres and is used as a cattle, sheep and pig pasture. There are currently pigs and ewes grazing on the property. During various times of the year, lambs and cattle may also come to graze. The site has been plagued with significant unwanted sources of debris and garbage, and as a result, the substantial impact has taken a toll on the viability and use of this land. The property was not gated or occupied for about 30 years, and due to being adjacent to the neighboring community and easily accessible from a public road, unauthorized and illegal dumping occurred. The Bertotti family started cleaning up their purchase in 2014, but it became apparent there was more debris on the land than anticipated, and additional help is needed. Currently household hazardous waste, appliances, tires, metal, electronic waste, and construction debris remain. Project goals are to cleanup and remove the unwanted material and remediate the property back to its original condition as pasture land for livestock grazing. The site is relatively flat and is easily accessible by vehicle and equipment. Following cleanup and restoration, the site will be monitored to prevent future dumping. The budget includes fencing, gates and locks.

Project Summary: CalRecycle has edited the following summary to reflect the approved grant project: Madera County and its Sierra National Forest are affected with various types of illegal dumping cases. The Coarsegold Resource Conservation District is assisting with cleanup, focusing their efforts on two sites. The first site includes cleanup of the 1.5 mile long Willow Creek Trail loop and the 3-acre Douglas Ranger Station turnout. The second site involves cleanup of the approximately 4-acre Central Camp Road grotto. These areas are zoned public open space, permit agricultural and grazing use, and are presently used for recreation. The sites are dirt roads with hiking trails located off the forest's main roads, accessible by vehicle most of the year, and prone to illegal dumping. A trusted contractor will conduct the site cleanups by bagging, transporting, recycling and disposing of all unwanted material. These sites contain items such as appliances, tires, construction debris and small dispersed camps. Recycling, litter receptacles and signage will be positioned in ideal locations to prevent further dumping. Volunteer trail managers and the Community Development Council who act on behalf of this land will monitor these areas. The local Boy Scout troop will be in charge of removing the material.
